Wallaby anecdotes:

- most like almonds, will give them blueberries as treats but don't want them to get too much sugar
- solitary in the wild unless an abundant food source is around our wallabies do fine together. They, of course, have plenty of food in a zoo environment
- more teeth problems here than in the wild because they don't get as much variety of browse compared with the wild
- our wallabies don't have the "typical" heart problems of other wallabies in human care,
 so their genetics are desired
- live to early teens in the wild as well as in captivity

- Dora interacted positively with keepers until she began to lay eggs
- Damian has been here since 2003, Dora came here in 2015
- Dora was very small when she got here but she's always been the one in charge!
- they love kale
- they run very fast due to an extra muscle in their calf only bird with calf muscles, 3 big toes/"dinosaur feet", kick at predators, very balanced, big ears without flaps - possibly causes predators to think they are looking backwards, good swimmers, love to wallow, very curious, feathers fluff out when agitated
