In 1926, Spencer Penrose founded the Cheyenne Mountain Zoo. Spurred into action by a growing collection of animals with nowhere to put them, Penrose was inspired to create the "zoo on the mountain." When he incorporated the Zoo as a non-profit public trust for the people of Colorado Springs, he could hardly have imagined that his small menagerie would someday become one of the finest private zoological parks in the country.

Today, the Cheyenne Mountain Zoo is thriving, in no small part because of the unwavering community support we receive. Because the Zoo operates without any local or regional tax support, it is our friends and supporters who help us to achieve our mission of conservation, education, and animal care. Over the years, many individuals and families have chosen to leave lasting gifts for the Zoo through planning giving, creating a unique way to leave their own legacy.

... and they are busier than you think. We all mention our local urban wildlife quite often when talking to school children. We have jays and raptors and magpies, it is surprising how often we have to explain to a guest what the beautiful black and white bird is. We have bear, bobcats, fox, coyote, rabbits, and deer galore. We have rodents



- most especially pesky squirrels and mice. But we also have beaver. Yes, the second largest rodent on the planet is actively pursuing its mission in our community including along a popular trail. Kathy Kidd led me to this treasure just a few days ago. Near milepost 34.5 along the Pikes Peak Greenway trail – the bit between



Fillmore and Garden of the Gods and near the dirt bike park, you can leave the trail and walk down to Monument Creek and view decades old elms



that have been gnawed away, fallen, nearly fallen, nibbled upon; and there are fresh wood chips you can gather as biofacts so that children can view the gnaw marks.



By the way you can do a search on line under Cheyenne Mountain Zoo beaver videos and find a number of them featuring our very own. I especially like the one where she takes tree limbs left in the middle of the aquatics building, back to her den. If you haven't seen it please look it up. A great story to tell guests
