

## President's Message – Nancy Hochman

Greetings Docents,

Election time is nearly upon us. With that in mind, it seems a good idea to remind all of us how this process works. The actual process is not complicated, but how it all fits together can be confusing.

It begins with a list – sent to all Docents or published in the Zoo Line – of all active Docents which includes a summary of the various jobs they have held on the CMZA Board. The list not only includes the Executive positions held but also the Supplemental Activities Chair positions, as well as positions on the IE Board.

This list is designed to give all of us an understanding of the responsibilities each of us has taken on. It is not a reflection of involvement, as we have all been part of our organization for different lengths of time. It is designed to show what our experiences have been. This should help when considering docents for various positions. The list of jobs held is as accurate as is humanly possible. There are probably omissions, but the list will give a general view of activity.

The Straw Ballot is the next piece. This lists the positions on the Executive Committee for the next year. In this case, it is for the year 2020-2021. You will see that the people holding positions of President-Elect, 1<sup>st</sup> VP-Elect and 2<sup>nd</sup> VP-Elect from 2019-2020 have moved up on the ballot and will automatically be the President, 1<sup>st</sup> VP and 2<sup>nd</sup> VP for 2020-2021. The current President moves automatically to Past-President.

You are being asked to make your suggestions for the "Elect" positions as well as the rest of the Executive Board. The Nominating Committee will review the suggestions and will make a choice for only the Executive positions. The committee meets in March and is chaired by the current Past-President. The Nominating Committee's selection, however, isn't final, and anyone can make a nomination from the floor at the May meeting when we vote on the slate of officers.

The Straw Ballot also lists the Supplemental Activities. This is your chance to put forward additional folks you think would be good for the various jobs available. Glenna has prepared a brief summary of the responsibilities for each position. If you are interested in a position, either on the Executive Board or a Supplemental Activity, I would suggest you talk to the current chair or office holder and discuss what the job entails.

You may put your own name on the Straw Ballot, in fact, you are encouraged to do so. The Supplemental Activities Chairs are selected by the outgoing (2019-2020) and incoming (2020-2021) Executive Boards following the May election. Volunteering, by putting your name down, lets both Executive Boards know you are willing to serve. The new Executive Board and Supplemental Activities Chairs will take office at the June joint meeting. *(continued next page)*

### President's Message continued


The members of the IE Board will also be chosen following the May election. They are selected by both the recently elected new CMZA President and the new IE Chair

The final piece is voting for the Nominating Committee for 2021. The current Nominating Committee was selected last year. There are nine separate groups on the ballot. All active docents are included. You are to vote for one docent in each box. Basically, active docents are placed in a box based on length of service and their status as an IE, IE/TE or TE/IE. In order to have a wide representation, the first two boxes are only for IE docents. All boxes have docents listed by their class training year. Effort is made to have the number of docents evenly distributed among the boxes, but that isn't always possible. It is a complicated task to fill the boxes. Those who will serve on this year's nominating committee are ineligible to serve next year. Those individuals who are elected to an "Elect" position are ineligible as they would be helping to choose their own successor. The election of the 2021 Nominating Committee also takes place at the May meeting. The new Nominating Committee will be listed in the Auxiliary Directory for 2020-2021.

### **Financial Report**

At the end of December the Operational Account showed expenditures for the year at \$4,804.34, leaving a balance of \$1,695.66. Expenses included computer supplies, get well and sympathy cards, supplies for the holiday party and DRC cleaning.

The balance in the Restricted Account at the end of December was \$26,607.19. This includes monies received for the BBY Valentine's project, and funds already designated for the Vet Clinic, conservation, keeper support, TB tests and other projects.
