Happy New Year to All Fellow Docents!

I hope that you were able to enjoy the holiday season, including the beauty of the CMZ Electric Safari. On Christmas Eve, I received an e-mail from Bob Chastain letting us know that Docents were missed



and important members of the Zoo family. What a delight to announce that Docents could enter Zoo grounds as guests without needing an e-ticket. What a gift to be able to come to the Zoo whenever we want as a Zoo family member. I hope the vaccine will enable all Docents, especially those who have been away for many months for whatever reason, to come again and safely experience the beauty of the CMZ, the animals and all the Zoo has to offer.

How could we have imagined or predicted how 2020 would unfold? As Docents we have had to be flexible, patient, and understanding, coping with last minute updates and changes to continue our important work and relationship with the Zoo. The pandemic has caused us to have to shelter in place, not feel comfortable coming to the Zoo, be even more welcoming as we interacted with guests while wearing a mask, social distancing, and completing a health check to ensure safety among ourselves, the guests, and animals. Yes, it has been an "abnormal" year, but surprising enough and despite it all, the Auxiliary has been able to endure and survive!

Twenty-three ZOOM Docents, with social distancing in place, worked a total of 289 hours in November while showcasing their animals. Bean, our two-toed sloth continues to provide a pleasing guest experience. Newest residents at the Loft are the African Pygmy Hedgehogs and the Banded Armadillo and are sure to be a hit for the guests. Year-to-date ZOOM hours are a whooping 1,972.50 hours! What a Zoo-rific effort from ZOOM Docents and Jeanie Baratono, Chair!

"Birds of a feather flock together" is true in the Big Backyard (BBY) as the "mentors" have welcomed the baby chicklets in the coop. There is some confusion however, with the concept of "parade." Chicklets have been scrambling about and clucking, "What is a parade?" "Where is the parade?" and "Can I be in the parade?" It appears it will take a while for them to "cluck" right in! Twenty-five Docents logged 125.75 hours for November and year-to-date 952 hours! Thank you BBY Docents and Cris Stoddard, Chair for "scratching out a living" in the BBY! Next challenge is to identify and learn the "dessert" names of the new chicklets.

Thank you to Marianne Brooks, Cart Master for providing Docents with sign up opportunities to work carts. Year-to-date, a total of 766.70 hours have been logged by 56 Docents. 



Animal Update (November 2020)

- Penguins Safara, Rufaro, and Pearl all laid eggs in November. None of them are SSP recommended breeders, so their eggs were pulled and disposed of.
- Ring-Tailed Lemur Hercules was seen breeding with both female lemurs, Rogue and Allagash, at the beginning of November.
- Hippos Biko and Zambezi continue to enjoy each other's company and now are sharing space overnight.
- Yokohama Chicken, Swedish Chef, was in declining health, hospitalized and the decision was to humanely euthanize her.
- Black-footed Ferret Honey Ryder passed away at the age of 6 years old.
- Pink-backed Pelican Penelope passed away.
 Necropsy indicated a bleed-out in her abdomen.
- Goeldi's monkeys Alice and Maxwell were transferred to Dakota Zoo.
- Black mangabey, Tana, and Lar Gibbon, Tembeling, were transferred to Moorpark Teaching Academy. Wolf's Guenon, Gouda, transferred to Niabi Zoo.
- Colobus monkeys had 3 large trees installed in their exhibit and the old trees removed. The monkeys began using their new trees and pathways immediately. This is a huge, new, and exciting enrichment opportunity for them.
- African Pygmy Hedgehogs cleared quarantine and have moved to the Loft.
- Banded Armadillo cleared quarantine and was moved to the Loft.
- Bornean Orangutan Ember lost her first tooth. "It is unknown if the Tooth Fairy came to visit".
- Penguin Rufaro, despite testing twice at a previous facility as a male, surprised WEA keepers after a radiograph determined that he/she had an egg inside. Staff is still investigating what could have indicated 2 "wrong" DNA tests!
- Mountain Lions Sitka, Adira, and Koda have all been introduced to each other and are spending most of the day together and staying overnight together.


