

President's Message

Docents!One of the newest conservation projects that Cheyenne Mountain Zoo supports is the Tsavo Trust in Africa. Tsavo East and West National Parks are the largest national parks in Kenya. Most of the parks aren't fenced, but contain the largest population of elephants in Kenya. The Tsavo is also home to some of the last remaining iconic "big tuskers". Big tuskers are elephants with more than 1000-pound ivory tusks on each side that scrape the ground. Their genetics are very rare but in Tsavo National Park the big tusker gene pool remains viable.

In April Bob Chastain visited Tsavo and reported back with these numbers:

Tsavo 1973: 8000 rhino

1983: 300 in Kenya

1980ish: 10 rhino

Now: 120 rhino (84 in sanctuary)

1973: 45k elephant in greater Tsavo area

1989: 5500 elephant in Tsavo

Now: 12,866 in Tsavo

"We've partnered with the Tsavo Trust because we believe in their field conservation efforts and feel they are effective in protecting both their elephant and black rhino populations alongside the Kenya Wildlife Service who take a lead role," Dr. Liza Dadone said.

At current rates, wild African elephants could go extinct in the next 15-20 years and wild black rhinoceros could go extinct in the next 5 years.

Cheyenne Mountain Zoo is currently the only zoo in the United States to support the Tsavo Trust. In May of 2016 \$25,000 was sent to the Tsavo Trust in Africa to help save African elephant and rhinos with their aerial surveillance efforts. Our African elephants and black rhino at Cheyenne Mountain Zoo are helping to save their wild counterparts by the feeding opportunities that our guests are given. It is an important conservation message and a way for our guests to participate in helping elephants and rhinos in the wild. *Jeanie Baratono*

This month the featured keeper is **Jenyva Fox**. Here are her words:

Like every zookeeper out there, my love of animals is what inspired me to pursue zoo keeping as my career. Now it has grown into something a little deeper as I want to help others fall in love with these animals so that they are more likely to help protect them and other animals that are closer to home.

A docent actually helped lead me in to zoo keeping when I was living in Montana. The Education Curator at ZooMontana told me about the zoo keeping program at Pikes Peak Community College. I was a graphic designer at

the time and was getting tired of being inside all the time, so I moved down here, enrolled in the program and here I am 14 years later!

Every day of my job is different, yet the same. Our animals need to be shifted on exhibit and fed, stalls and exhibits need to be cleaned, and diets need to be made. We make sure to have time to enrich ALL of our animals every day, some twice a day! We also train with our animals, which is the best part of the day. That one time with our animals is truly special. Public education and interaction has also been an important part of the routine in African Rift Valley over the years.

Hands down the greatest challenge of being a zookeeper is losing the animals we care so much about. I spend more time with "my" animals at the zoo that I do with my pets. As a keeper I would do anything for my animals to take the best possible care of them. *Jenyva Fox*

ENRICHMENT

How do you cannoli?

This is the number one question I get, from docents and people I talk to about the zoo.

Short answer: monthly and it is animal dependent. Long answer: It has changed over the years. The basic recipe now is popcorn (compliments of our Pre-Dawn Poppers), then add cereal, low or no sugar like Cheerios or an organic rolled oats. We used to use Quaker Oats but found it breaks apart in the cannoli and is nearly impossible to pick up if it falls out of the animals' treat. Now customization begins for each specific area. The elephant senior girls are watching their weight and have given up pasta (women of a certain age I tell this to can relate and laugh out loud). The gorillas are calorie counting too so all of Primate World's cannoli has been restricted from dried fruit (don't tell the Orangutans whose fault it is!). The Colobus, Asiatic Bears, Spectacled and Grizzlies absolutely can NOT have raisins or Craisins. It would be very harmful for them.

Monkey Pavilion are the only ones who can have absolutely everything.

We fill toilet paper rolls with a quarter cup for them and the Colobus (with their approved mixture). Everybody else prefers to have paper towel rolls. All are filled with a quarter cup of the specific approved mixture except the elephants, they get to have their paper towel cannoli filled 100%. We crimp one end and use non dyed packing paper to hold it all in.

I presort the rolls so we are ready to go. We mix the recipes and are usually out within an hour. It is fun, used for defining moments, private encounters and one of the only things we get to do directly for the animals. I hope you join in soon! **Donations needed**: dried fruit (get raisins separate is possible), paper towel rolls, small dried pasta.

Wild Horse Sanctuary

September 23, 2017 found 11 Docents, @ Husband and 1 Sister at the Wild Horse Sanctuary in Hot Springs, S. Dakota. Many took this opportunity to plan a vacation trip and see the other sights in that area. Dayton O. Hyde founded this non-profit Corporation in 1988 on 11,000 acres of private land.

There were over 700 Horses that they care for including American Wild Mustangs, Spanish Choctaw Mustangs. Each group is kept separated and with their own stallion to preserve the Bloodline. This is the scene we were able to capture in the Gelding that was scheduled for that Saturday. We found out that the beginning and the end of the movie "Hildago" was filmed here. They also care for many rescue horse the get to live out the rest of their lives here in peace.
