Financial Report

TB Tests for Everyone

If you choose to get an outside test at your doctor's office, you will need to give the results to Joan Adkins. She is our liaison to the Zoo for TB testing, and will make sure Edventure, our Registrar and Zoo HR all get the proper notification.

What's New with Biofacts

Glenn Carson and Nancy Hochman went through our collection of biofacts and those items are once again, at least for the moment, organized. The up-to-date biofact notebook is in the DRC.

Please be sure to sign the biofacts out and in and, *most importantly*, put them back where you found them. Remember tour season is starting, so please do not take any biofact out of any safari kit or the ARV tour kits. We have plenty of wonderful biofacts for house talks without disturbing the kits.

Some biofacts have been moved. The python skull and sheddings are now in the Australia Box, as Scutes is the home of our Burmese python. Binoculars are now in the RMW/Asian Highlands cart as well as the Grizzly Bear cart. Binoculars will make it easier for guests to spot our animals.

Reminders

- Docents may only use the new center lane to bypass traffic on the road to the Zoo if dressed in full uniform and on the way to scheduled volunteer work for the Zoo. This is a privilege which can be revoked if we misuse it.
- Using E-cigarettes (vaping) is considered the same as smoking a regular cigarette or other tobacco product; they should only be used in the designated smoking areas. Please point guests toward those designated areas as needed.
- 2019-2020 Directories will be available at the September TE and IE meetings. Please pick yours up at the meeting if at all possible. Through the year, please send any updates (address, phone, e-mail, certifications, etc.) to Marie Poyzer. Amendment to Rules and Policies Definitions

At the August Auxiliary Board meeting an Amendment to Rules and Policies was passed. This amendment corrected an error regarding Annual Reporting Period

The current definition should read as follows: **Definitions** [1] **Annual Reporting Period** – The annual reporting period for purposes of the financial proceedings and budget of the Cheyenne Mountain Zoo Auxiliary shall coincide with the CMZ Fiscal Year (currently May 1 to April 30.). The annual reporting period for the purpose of recording service program hours shall be from June 1 to May 31.

New Safari Kit Checkout Process

The checkout process for safari kits has changed. We will no longer be using separate sheets in each kit for sign out/sign in. We have a spreadsheet on Google Drive for all kit sign outs. There are two columns with check boxes for docents to use, one for checking out a kit and one for checking it back in (*Kit Out* and *Kit In*).

The Sign Out Sheet can be accessed two ways:

- The computer in the DRC. There will be an icon on the desktop. Open the spreadsheet via the icon.
- Remotely via a link that the Safari Coordinator will be emailing to all safari docents.

The good news is that the spreadsheet will automatically calculate individual safari hours earned, as well as a cumulative total of all safari hours for the calendar year for each docent.

Watch your e-mail for notices about training sessions. Also, once you receive the link to the Sign Out Sheet in an e-mail from the Safari Coordinator, you can review the process by looking at instructions and information on the first tab in that spreadsheet. If you have questions at any time, you can e-mail Gayle Irani, this year's Safari Coordinator.

Linking Your King Soopers Card

In order for the Auxiliary to receive the rewards from your purchases at King Soopers, your card has to be linked to the Auxiliary's community rewards program. This change does not affect your gas card points.

If you already have a King Soopers account:

- Go to the King Soopers official site www.kingsoopers.com
- Click on My Account
- Put in your password
- On the left side of the screen, click **Community Rewards**
- Search for Cheyenne Mountain Zoo Auxiliary or our organization number which is: BC371 (either of these will work)
- When search comes up, click Enroll (if you don't go down and click on enroll it won't link your account to the Auxiliary's rewards)

If you don't already have a King Soopers' account but have a loyalty card, these are the instructions to create an account:

- Go to the King Soopers' official site www.kingsoopers.com
- Click on Welcome/Sign-in pull-down
- Click Sign in
- At the bottom of the page on the left, click **Create** an **Account**. You will need an email address to create an account.
- Create a password for this account
- Enter the number of your loyalty card found on the reverse side of the card or if you have your phone number as an alternate ID you may use that number instead of the loyalty card number.
- Don't forget to go all the way to the bottom and click "Create an Account" located on the left side.
- Once that account has been created, then click on Community Rewards on the left side of the page
- In the search box put in Cheyenne Mountain Zoo Auxiliary or our organization number **BC371** (either will work)
- When search comes up, click Enroll (if you don't go down and click on enroll it won't link your account to the Auxiliary's rewards)
